

Book Group Meeting September 21



Redistricting Michigan Meeting September 24



The League of Women Voters to Host an Educational Town Hall, "Redistricting in Michigan: Should Politicians Choose Their Voters?"

LWVBCC will host an educational Town Hall on redistricting on September 24 at 6:30 pm at the Berrien RESA, 711 St. Jospeh

Ave., Berrien Springs. The presentation will explore how legislative lines are drawn in Michigan, who draws them and why it is a critically important question for those concerned about fair representation. The speaker is Elizabeth Ennis, former LWVBCC president and member of the LWVMI Advocacy Committee.

In Michigan, the district lines are drawn by elected officials in the legislature, effectively allowing politicians to choose their voters and giving the political party in power at the time a tremendous advantage. What are the ramifications of partisan drawn districts that favor one party over another? Is there a better and fairer way to do this? What are the alternatives?

The U.S. Supreme Court's recent decision on Arizona's Independent Restricting Commission said there is an alternative and that citizens, not just politicians, have the right to decide how Congressional district lines are drawn. The decision has grabbed the public's attention. Some have asked if Michigan, like Arizona, should use an independent commission to draw the lines, not only for the Congressional Districts, but for the State House and Senate, as well. This alternative and others will be presented at the Town Hall.

This fall, the League of Women Voters of Michigan will host 30 community based, redistricting education programs across the state of Michigan. All Town Halls are open to the public. Everyone is invited and welcome.

Local Government: Where It's At by Melissa Clapper



Someone once said (I wish I knew who) "All politics are local". It's hard to keep that in mind as we hear/read reports indicating that over a billion dollars will be funneled into 2016 elections. The reports are mostly focused on the presidential campaigns. But don't be fooled into thinking that the presidential election is the only election we should be paying attention to.

I was reading an article recently where a staff member of the conservative American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) said while discussing the trend toward minimum-wage increases: "Perhaps the biggest threat comes from the local level." ALEC spends a lot of time at the local and state levels. Why you ask? As of Dec. 2014 the 113th Congress passed around 296 laws for the year. Compare that to legislation that has been passed at our state level. About 40% of the more than 1,300 bills introduced last year in Lansing became law. The Koch Brothers (and other multimillionaires/billionaires) know that the best way to achieve their goal of buying and controlling our democracy is to concentrate at the local and state level. Those are the places where things actually get done.

I have been a League member for 45 years and a member of LWVBCC for about 14 years. I have been on the LWVBCC Board all those years, served as president for 5 years. and since then as Communications Coordinator. It has been a great and rewarding experience. And I will miss you all.

One of the great challenges of a big move is sorting and discarding. That means I have been going through my extensive LWVBCC files and reliving our many accomplishments: the candidate forums, voter guides and voter registration drives; the timely meetings on issues as diverse as the future of Detroit to pipelines and fracking; the educational meetings on subjects like campaign finance and the separation of powers; the field trips to places like the Cook Nuclear Plant and Hull House in Chicago; the formation of the Book Group and our good fortune getting grants; and our technology evolution from zero to the website, Face Book, You Tube and this newsletter (we have led many Leagues in adopting technology).

There were folders of clippings, on League events but also on national, state and local issues. Some were collected for articles in this newsletter or as research for debate questions or because of League studies. Amazing how we have progressed so little on so many issues--Michigan's roads, immigration, abortion, gun control, fossil fuels. I am particularly disturbed about the proliferation of guns. We have always been a rather violent society, but it is getting worse. There are daily reports of people shooting each other and about once a week a real atrocity. The on-air murders of two TV station employees was horrific. Keeping guns out of the hands of the mentally ill sounds good, but it clearly isn't working in practice.

I am glad to be moving to a progressive state like Oregon. I will be registered to vote automatically when I get my driver's license and all voting is by mail (which explains the very high voter participation rate). Oregon is the only state that has not passed any laws limiting the right to an abortion. Portland has terrific public transportation and a beautiful new bridge we can see out our window.

Naturally, I will join the Portland League. The League has always been the go-to organization for smart, politically aware people. If you are not a member of LWVBCC you should join and all members should get involved and contribute their time and talents as they can. The need is great, as Melissa Clapper, LWVBCC Board member, explains well in her essay above and as Liz Ennis states in the piece on the October general meeting.
